# **HOW THIS CAME ABOUT**

The C:ORE Risk Conference was conceived by Matthew Davies and Liz Gray, both with decades of involvement in risk management and post incident response in the various fields to which this conference is applicable. Matt and Liz have worked together on risk management related aspects of (very complex) international endeavours in the past (and continue to do so) and had discussed, over several years, the need - and benefits of having an expert led conference providing not only the "next" step" in risk management education for those who had undertaken a relevant foundation level certification, but a forum where ideas and good practice could be shared - and an international network developed. 
